

# LES AMIS DE LA MONTAGNE WHO WE ARE

For the past 30 years, Les amis de la montagne has been involved in all matters related to the protection and enhancement of Mount Royal. With its three summits, this iconic landmark that we call "the mountain" covers some ten square kilometres. It is home to residential neighbourhoods, several of Montréal's founding institutions, vast cemeteries, and the magnificent Mount Royal Park, a grand 200-hectare public space that defines the heart of the city.

Owing to its special status as a Quebec government-classified heritage site, a large part of the mountain enjoys protection measures to ensure its careful redevelopment and improvement. Surrounded by a thriving city, Mount Royal is nonetheless exposed to the constant threat of urban densification and development.

In collaboration with a growing community of heritage and environmental advocates dedicated to the care of the mountain, Les amis de la montagne endeavours to foster a culture of respect and responsible development for this exceptional space.





# A WORD OF INTRODUCTION\_

Right from its founding, in April 1986, Les amis de la montagne initiated a dialogue with the leader of the Montreal Citizens' Movement, who was running for City Mayor. This dialogue would redefine the relationship between citizens and decision-makers concerning the protection of Mount Royal. Starting in November 1986, and throughout his two terms as Mayor of Montréal, Jean Doré favoured exchanges with the community as an essential component in governance of the mountain. For its part, Les amis quickly established the importance of its representations to the city. This collaboration between citizens, associations and public administration led to the adoption of concrete measures to protect the Mount Royal territory. Refocusing the significance of the mountain's identity, landscape. culture and history was also part of the progress made during that period. Les amis de la montagne and the City of Montréal showed Jean Doré their appreciation by awarding him the Prix du Mont-Royal in May 2015.

It is with much pride that I think about the men and women who, thanks to their expertise, commitment and generosity, have made Les amis de la montagne the accomplished organisation it is today, drawing its strength from the collective desire to safeguard the mountain and translating this into enlightened action. I would like to thank the Board of Directors for its commitment, our staff for its diligence, and our governors and volunteers who play a key role in supporting the cause of Mount Royal. Finally, I want to thank our generous donors without whom Les amis de la montagne would not have the means to match its ambitions.

While the attachment of Montrealers to their mountain is undeniable, the challenges related to its protection persist. The quality of choices and actions of our decision makers will determine the impact on Mount Royal of such phenomena as the emerald ash borer, or the repurposing of institutional properties on the mountain's slopes, which are undergoing profound changes, not to mention the intensive use of a park in the heart of the city.

More than ever, Les amis de la montagne must be involved in representations concerning the sustainability of Mount Royal. In this regard, I would like to point out the quality of the relationship between Les amis and the City of Montréal. Beyond the agreement that benefits users of Mount Royal Park, our exchanges aim to place the entire mountain at the heart of the discussions on the development of the city.

With 30 years of achievement to its credit, Les amis de la montagne is in the prime of life! Our governors, Board of Directors and permanent team staff include founding members of Les amis as well as individuals who have come on board at the height of their professional careers. 
# Key Issues of Concern in 2015-16

THE FUTURE OF LARGE INSTITUTIONAL COMPLEXES ON MOUNT ROYAL

Several Montreal institutions – the Royal Victoria Hospital, the Hôtel-Dieu de Montréal, the Shriners Hospital for Children and the Couvent des Sœurs missionnaires de l'immaculée-Conception, just to name a few – are undergoing important changes and are vacating their premises on Mount Royal. These sites define the mountain and how it is used. Decisions regarding their future vocations will have a major impact on the mountain as well as on the iconic identity of Montreal.

This year, Les amis took stock and analysed the large institutional complexes that are undergoing these major changes. We presented this information at a roundtable discussion, which was part of the colloquium *Urbanisme durable et villes de demain*, organised by the *Conseil du bâtiment durable du Québec* in January 2016.

We reviewed the goals to be aimed for in finding new vocations for these complexes. These include the preservation and enhancement of heritage values of the sites (grounds and buildings), using the full potential of the greening of these sites, as well as revising the borders between the park and adjacent grounds—this with a view to enlarging Mount Royal Park. Additional goals include improving public access on the sites and accessibility to the mountain. We underlined these points during a meeting entitled Entretien portant sur les hôpitaux, universités et propriétés gouvernementales dont la vocation est incertaine, organised by the Service de la mise en valeur du territoire de la Ville de Montréal as part of the City's Plan d'action en patrimoine.

motherhouse belonging to the Congrégation des sœurs des Saints-Noms-de-Jésus-et-de-Marie, located at 1420 Mont-Royal Avenue, in Outremont. This establishment of great heritage value is part of the ring of institutions that are found on Mount Royal. In May 2015, we met Olivier Leclerc, who purchased the property and presented his project for restoring and transforming it into condominiums. Mr Leclerc is committed to conserving public right of way through the property's gardens, which allows access to the Saint-Jean-Baptiste woods, leading to the Outremont summit. He also agreed to maintain public access to the establishment's historic chapel. After studying the proposal, we communicated our support to the Borough of Outremont and the City of Montréal.

Les amis are also concerned about the future of the former

## ADVOCACY (CONT'D) \_\_\_\_

#### **RUTHERFORD PARK**

Les amis de la montagne continued its efforts to encourage the City of Montréal in creating an exemplary redevelopment project for Rutherford Park, a jewel of heritage landscape on the mountain's southern slope. The City has proposed a new sports hub in this public space with the installation of synthetic grass, sports lighting and related equipment. This proposal is not in keeping with several directives, guidelines, and measures adopted by the City and the Quebec Government to protect and enhance Mount Royal's heritage zone. The City's project would also include restrictions on free access to the overall space due to partial privatisation, as planned in a partnership agreement with McGill University that gives it exclusive use of the multisport playing field during a major part of the park's open hours.

Les amis de la montagne detailed its position in a document entitled *Vision et recommandations pour le réaménagement du parc Rutherford*, which was sent to the City and to the Ministry of Culture and Communications (MCC) in August 2015. Concerning this issue, we also met the *Conseil du patrimoine culturel du Québec*, which falls under the MCC's jurisdiction. Other groups have also expressed their opposition to the city's proposal for Rutherford Park. Among them are the Friends of Rutherford Park, the David Suzuki Foundation, CRE-Montréal (Montreal's regional environment council), Héritage Montréal and the National Association of Olmsted Parks. The City of Montréal would have to obtain authorisation from the MCC before proceeding with the implementation of this project.

# Advisory Role and Advancement of Knowledge

Les amis de la montagne was invited to make use of its expertise in studying and managing several projects that could have an impact on the mountain. We also sit on the advisory, scientific and research committees of universities and organisations. In this way we represent the interests of the mountain while contributing to the advancement of knowledge in education, cultural mediation, environmental protection, city planning and protection of landscape heritage. Among our affiliations and projects in 2015-16 are the following:

- Participation as a leading member of the *Table de concertation* du Mont-Royal (TCMR) since its creation ten years ago. The TCMR brings together representatives of some forty major institutions in education, health, religion and the private sector that are established on the mountain. Also included are organisations dedicated to heritage and environmental protection, as well as municipal and ministerial departments responsible for administering the government designated heritage site of Mount Royal. The TCMR constitutes an important forum for mobilising key actors in the management and harmonious development of the mountain. With our intimate knowledge of Mount Royal's situation on the ground and the challenges related to its care, Les amis has brought a significant contribution to discussions at the TCMR, helping to create informed consensus concerning accessibility, environmental conservation, management, and the protection and enhancement of Mount Royal Park and the mountain as a whole.
- Participation in the TCMR working group on the Mount Royal heritage site conservation plan that is currently being developed by the Ministry of Culture and Communications. This document is intended to guide the Ministry in preservation, rehabilitation and enhancement initiatives.
- \_ Draft of an observation report on the use of public spaces in Mount Royal Park in May 2015 and its presentation to the *Bureau du Mont-Royal* and the TCMR in June 2015. The resulting consensus at the TCMR led to implementation of an action plan to rectify problematic issues in Mount Royal Park, with certain tangible improvements, notably the hiring of a park warden in spring of 2016.



- In an advisory capacity with the City of Montréal and organisers of the **Ski Tour Canada 2016** / FIS Cross-Country World Cup, we produced a report on the potential impact of holding the event in Mount Royal Park, including environmental and public accessibility impacts. We also submitted to the *Bureau du Mont-Royal* an observation report on the actual event, which took place on the mountain in March 2016. This report will be presented at the next *Table de concertation du Mont-Royal*.
- \_ Analysis of two projects proposed by the Service des grands parcs, du verdissement et du mont Royal de la Ville de Montréal. These concern improvements to the Mount Royal Chalet sector and construction of a new park entrance in the Cedar/ Côte-des-Neiges sector. The projects include the implementation of ecological management practices that will strengthen the biodiversity of Mount Royal Park as well as improve park accessibility. We trust that these efforts will produce favourable outcomes for the mountain, its park and its visitors.
- Analysis of the **Discovery Stops** (Escales Découvertes) project proposed by the Service des grands parcs, du verdissement et du mont Royal de la Ville de Montréal, with an evaluation of impacts on Mount Royal Park and the formulation of recommendations.
- Advisory role with **Équiterre** in planning its 2016 benefit race on the mountain as authorised by the *Ville de Montréal*, with an evaluation of the impact on Mount Royal Park and the formulation of recommendations.
- Participation in the evaluation of proposals for major public events in Mount Royal Park, as developed by the **Société des célébrations du 375**° **anniversaire de Montréal**, and the formulation of recommendations.
- Participation in three days of consultation with community stakeholders on programming options for the **River to the Mountain Urban Walkway**, a major legacy project planned for the 375<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of Montreal.

- \_ Associate member of the advisory committee on the next University of Montreal Mountain Campus master development plan.
- \_ Member of the partnership platform of **Centr'ERE** (Centre for Research on Education and Eco-Citizenship) at UQAM and participation in a review of this subject as it pertains to Quebec.
- \_ Participation in a province-wide workshop organised by the Association québecoise des interprètes du patrimoine (AQIP), with the presentation of a report on interpretive activities offered by Les amis de la montagne, in relation to restoration work at Beaver Lake in Mount Royal Park.
- Links maintained with Park People in Toronto and participation in their annual conference in spring 2015, with the presentation of activities offered by Les amis in Mount Royal Park and our partnership with the City of Montréal.
- Member of the scientific council of the *Institut du patrimoine de l'Université du Québec à Montréal* (UQAM). In this role, Les amis presented issues concerning the protection and enhancement of Mount Royal to students enrolled in the Bachelor programme in Urban Planning at UQAM. In a joint initiative involving the Institute, we also planned a workshop that took place in May 2016, on the theme of protecting views of Mount Royal and its symbolic value in the heart of the city. In planning for this workshop, Les amis oversaw the implementation of a mandate to identify and characterise the views of Mount Royal. This was entrusted to our intern, Jean-Michel Boivin, a masters student in Urban and Tourism Studies at UQAM.

## AWARENESS-BUILDING AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT\_

This year, Les amis de la montagne set out to promote its services and activities with the goal of:

- \_ inviting the public to enjoy rich and varied programming in education, culture, outdoor activities and environmental conservation presented by Les amis;
- \_ making the mountain known as an invaluable asset to the city and its residents;
- \_ keeping the community informed of urban development issues that will shape the future of the mountain and building awareness of Les amis' efforts to safeguard Mount Royal;
- \_ encouraging respect and responsibility for the mountain, an appreciation of the important role it plays in the centre of the city, as well as participation in its protection;
- \_ developing volunteer involvement in our environmental conservation activities;
- \_ inviting Montrealers to support the mission of Les amis by making a gift.

Our communications materials touched on such events and activities as the 2015 Mount Royal Month and the Spring Clean-Up (*Corvée*) on the mountain, *Musical Sundays at the Mount Royal Chalet*, the *Prix du Mont-Royal 2015* awarded to Jean Doré, our seasonal activities calendar, the call for volunteers for our Environmental Stewardship Programme, a benefit exhibition of works by Nicolas Ruel at the Galerie de Bellefeuille, our *Chapeau mont Royal*, the problems related to feeding racoons on the mountain, the launch of the new Café des Amis at the Beaver Lake pavilion, the *Tuques Bleues* celebration, Les amis day camps, and the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Les amis de la montagne on April 1, 2016.

Many of the above were covered by media, thus creating public awareness of Les amis and Mount Royal. However, media reports were often related to problems of park usage and management challenges faced by the City of Montréal, such as garbage collection, missed construction deadlines at Beaver Lake in summer 2015, and budget overruns. In addition, problems with the natural skating rink on the lake last winter aroused the media's interest.

Over the period of several months, there was considerable media coverage of Rutherford Park, while in the spring, the potential damage that may be caused by the emerald ash borer generated a series of interviews.

Finally, the promotion on Facebook of large gatherings that pose a risk to the integrity of Mount Royal – notably Let's Turn the Mountain into a Giant Dancefloor! and the Montreal Wish Lantern Festival – attracted media coverage. In the ensuing interviews, Les amis de la montagne and the City were able to set the record straight on the kinds of events permitted in the park and the procedures for obtaining necessary authorisations.

## The Importance of Public Consultation

The actions of Les amis de la montagne are based on the conviction that there is a direct link between active responsible citizen participation and quality governance. Since our establishment in 1986, we have promoted public consultation as the preferred tool for cultivating a healthy climate of confidence between decision-makers and the community, and to ensure the best development choices for our city, our living spaces and our mountain. Over the last several years, the Office de consultation publique de Montréal (OCPM) has played a major role in the analysis of major development projects on Mount Royal.

In May 2015, in collaboration with the *École nationale d'adminstration publique de Montréal* (ÉNAP) and with the participation of the OCPM, we organised a roundtable discussion entitled **Mount Royal and Public Consultation: Lessons** for a Strategic Approach to City Planning.



Hosted by Louise Roy, past chair of the OCPM, the meeting gave rise to rewarding discussion among Nancy Bouchard, doctorate in analysis and management of public policy, ÉNAP, Louis Delaoustre, Co-Founder of Potloc, Richard Ryan, City Councillor, Mile-End District, Dominique Ollivier, Chair, OCPM, and Cameron Charlebois, Chair, GPMC Montreal Inc.-Strategies in Urban Development.

Some 70 people attended the roundtable discussion, which took place at the  $\acute{E}NAP$  offices.

# MOUNT ROYAL PARK VISITOR SERVICES\_\_\_

Les amis de la montagne plays a key role in serving the public in Mount Royal Park. The range of services we provide, as part of an agreement with the City of Montréal, aims to enhance visitors' experience of the mountain.

## **SMITH HOUSE**

The headquarters of Les amis since 1999, Smith House is the main reception centre in Mount Royal Park. We manage a welcome desk where visitors have access to comprehensive information on available services and activities. Our permanent exhibition, titled *Mount Royal – A Territory to Discover*, is presented free of charge and offers a fascinating introduction to the mountain. The house is also home to a nature boutique and the Café des Amis. In 2015-2016, Les amis de la montagne received close to 350,000 visits at Smith House.





## CAFÉ DES AMIS

Starting in December 19, 2015, Les amis de la montagne extended its restaurant services in the park. Based on ten successful years of the Café des Amis at Smith House, we had the opportunity to open a second location at Beaver Lake. As part of an agreement with the City of Montréal, the Café des Amis aims to provide park visitors with a place to relax and enjoy good food in a spectacular setting. The restaurant at the Beaver Lake Pavilion represents a great opportunity for Les amis to enhance activities around the lake, benefiting families, hikers, skiers, skaters, snowshoers and other visitors to this section of the park.

## NATURE BOUTIQUE

With its two locations – Smith House and the Chalet – our nature boutique provides a warm welcome to a growing clientele which comes to buy original souvenirs, maps, specialised books, seasonal clothing, toys and children's educational books. Artists, artisans and small businesses now represent more than a third of our suppliers and their locally made products are greatly appreciated. Our postcards and tee shirts feature local designers and photographers and are also very popular.

## **OUTDOOR EQUIPMENT RENTAL**

Located at the Beaver Lake Pavilion, the equipment rental service for skating, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, and snow tubing saw a decrease of 25% this year. Factors include a late winter, limited tobogganing and tubing runs, and the failure to open the rink on Beaver Lake, with only the adjacent artificial ice rink accessible. Earlier in the year, during the summer of 2015, limited access to the Beaver Lake site due to major construction work had already caused activities to be suspended in this sector. This also resulted in lower revenues from outdoor equipment rentals.



## **Smith House Undergoes Renovation**

Built in 1858, Smith House is one of the last examples of neoclassical rural residences of the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century. In 1999, it benefited from a complete renovation, supported by private contributions and the three levels of government. This year, the house underwent a new restoration phase that included stonework, roof repair and improvements in insulation and ventilation on the upper floors. Undertaken by the City of Montréal, which owns the house, this work necessitated moving most of Les amis's team. From June to October 2015, we continued our work in construction trailers in a parking area beside the site. Smith House was restored to its former beauty by winter 2016.

# EDUCATIONAL, OUTDOOR AND CULTURAL PROGRAMMES\_\_

This year, members of the public of all ages took advantage of the dynamic and stimulating programmes offered by Les amis de la montagne. They enjoyed nature and fresh air, (re)discovered the secrets and riches of Mount Royal, and deepened their understanding of the challenges of caring for this spectacular natural setting in the heart of the city.

## The Mountain and Young People

**SCHOOL GROUPS** 

The year was marked by difficult negotiations between teachers and the government. Pressure tactics reduced the number of school trips and extracurricular activities. As a result, Les amis saw a drop in the number of students visiting the mountain in

the fall and winter. Our educators made the most of the situation by diversifying and renewing school programmes and creating new pilot projects. In spite of the challenges, more than 7,750 students, from kindergarten to high school, enjoyed our educational and outdoor programmes.

Over 200 grade 5 and 6 students from five different schools participated in the *Explore the Summits of Montreal* project. This exploration of Mount Royal heritage, both natural and built, was divided into three visits. In the autumn, the students visited Westmount Summit where they learned about Mount Royal's geological origins; they ended the day at Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal, where they discovered the great Beckerath organ. In winter, they reached Outremont Summit on snowshoes and enjoyed a scientific workshop at *Polytechnique Montréal*. In spring, a whole day in Mount Royal Park found them on the mountain's highest summit. This project was made possible through the participation of the Ministry of Education (*Une école montréalaise pour tous*), Polytechnique Montréal (*Folie technique*), and Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal.

As for the Seeds for the Future of Mount Royal programme, more than 250 students from seven schools grew saplings from seeds harvested on Mount Royal. We augmented this programme with a presentation in class on the use of wood and by visiting an open house in the nursery located on the future Outremont campus of the University of Montréal. Also included were environmental stewardship activities on Mount Royal.

In partnership with École Charles-Lemoyne in Pointe-Saint-Charles, the first school in the Commission scolaire de Montréal to offer an alternative component focused on nature, Les amis welcomed 153 students from this school to Mount Royal for activities adapted to its educational goals. Activities were also made available to students registered in the regular programme of the same school.

Aside from this new programme, regular educational activities offered by Les amis drew some 2,800 students. These included exploratory hikes in natural areas of the mountain with themes such as awareness of environmental issues, consumerism, civic duty, citizenship, and health and wellness. With our outdoor winter activities, we welcomed another 3,900 students. Snow tube sliding was the most popular activity, followed by skating. Some classes enrolled in cross-country ski sessions and others in snowshoeing. Skates, skis, snowshoes and tubes were provided by our outdoor equipment rental service.

## **CLUB AMIS**

Inspired by the Forest School movement that is gaining in popularity in Canada and across Europe, we launched *Club AMIS*, a pilot project that aims to cultivate in young people a wonder for nature and an appreciation of the well-being experienced on the mountain. In this project, more than 80 young people enjoyed being immersed in nature through a parent-child programme for 3 to 5 year olds, the Saturday club for 6 to 8 year olds, and an extracurricular programme for 9 to 11 year olds. The results are promising: a wonder and appreciation of nature regardless of weather, learning about the concept of the ecosystem, fostering a culture of respect for the environment and the importance its protection, development of a sense of belonging and commitment to Mount Royal. Two team members, Maria-E. Nacher Sol La Lande and Lila Benzid, chose to study aspects of this project as part of their research for, respectively, a masters in Education and in Environmental Sciences at UQAM.



Les Amis participated in the creation of the *Table de la petite enfance d'Outremont*, started by *Outremont en famille* and supported by *Avenir d'enfants*. We initiated the development of a new programme on Mount Royal, a variation on Club Amis, for families in this arrondissement who have children from 0-5 years old.

### DAY CAMP

Our day camp was more popular than ever, and to meet demand, it was necessary to add a group for 5 and 6 year olds in the summer of 2015. Over 250 young people from 5 to 11 attended the camp during one or two weeks during the summer. Note that 43% of them were "alumni" who renewed their experience again this year – proof that the camp is greatly appreciated. Some also attended the spring break camp in March 2016.

## CROSS-COUNTRY SKI CLUB - YOUTH PROGRAMME

In 2016, the Cross-Country Ski Club operated by Les amis de la montagne numbered 225 participants aged 4 to 15. This was an increase in enrolment of 45% compared to last year. Our youth programme offered eight lessons in Mount Royal Park, on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays, January through March.



## Programmes for the General Public

Our public programmes are designed to allow visitors to gain a new perspective on the mountain as a result of their experience with Les amis. These programmes shed light on Mount Royal's place in the history of the city, and its current role in the daily lives of Montrealers. They also bring to light the developments that have shaped the mountain over the years, making it the special place that so many are drawn to today. This enriches the experience those people we welcome, accompany or simply engaged with informally.

Our year started with the launch of *Mount Royal Month* on a beautiful Sunday, May 3, 2015. This great Montreal celebration of spring on the mountain attracted 20,000 visitors (see page 15).

## MUSICAL SUNDAYS

Our *Musical Sundays at the Mount Royal Chalet* were greeted with enthusiasm both by music lovers, who came especially to attend the concerts, and park visitors passing by. With support from the City of Montréal and TD Bank Group, the six concerts in this year's series attracted some 4,000 spectators. Each concert was followed by a guided tour of the Chalet. Presenting exceptional and talented young artists, most of them from schools located on the mountain, these free events continued the tradition of public concerts on the summit that dates from the beginning of the 20th century.

#### **WALKING TOURS**

Our various guided walking tours were a chance for close to 1,140 people to explore and learn more about the territory of Mount Royal, its history, links with the city, biodiversity and other unique characteristics.

In April 2016, on the occasion of the UNESCO International Day for Monuments and Sites, Les amis organised a guided walk from the MAA Sports Club to the edge of Beaver Lake, with a focus on the fascinating history of sports and games on Mount Royal. The MAA and McGill University were also involved in hosting this special tour, which was sold out.



# EDUCATIONAL, OUTDOOR AND CULTURAL PROGRAMMES (CONT'D) \_\_\_\_

## PHOTO COMPETITION

La montagne en images, our annual photo competition, attracted a record number of amateur and professional photographers. The winning photographs were exhibited at Smith House and posted on Les amis' website. Close to 1,800 wonderful photos of the mountain have been collected in this way.

## **ACTIVITIES AROUND BEAVER LAKE**

We designed a new information kiosk for the Beaver Lake sector which was visited by almost 2,000 people over weekends in September and October 2015. The educators on duty talked with visitors about issues relating to the conservation of wetlands and streams on the mountain and the recent restoration of the lake. A rally around the lake allowed families to rediscover the area, reopened after years of work.

In the fall, as part of the Quebec Intercultural Storytelling Festival, Les amis hosted *La lampée de baladins*, a show featuring giant marionettes and music, which took place around the lake. This unique experience in the park delighted both young and old.

## WINTER WITH LES AMIS

Mount Royal has been at the heart of Montrealers' experience of winter for generations. To highlight this association, Les amis offered a new interpretive outdoor activity in front of Smith House. Drawing over 4,200 visitors, it brought to light the history of winter pastimes on the mountain, as well as animal life in this season.

This winter, some 800 people enjoyed our snowshoeing treks, which provided a unique experience of the mountain's tranquillity and its magical views of the city at night.

Taking advantage of a 20-kilometre network of cross-country ski trails in Mount Royal Park, Les Amis' Cross-Country Ski Club provided private and group sessions to 165 skiers this year.

# MAY 2015: MOUNT ROYAL MONTH

The 11<sup>th</sup> edition of *Mount Royal Month* was a vibrant celebration of the mountain. This was an opportunity for the public to reacquaint itself with all that the place has to offer, to take part in its conservation and to renew its commitment to preserve this magnificent green space in Montreal. Organised by Les amis and presented in partnership with the City of Montréal and with generous support from the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation, Mount Royal Month offered a wide-ranging program.

This great Montreal celebration of spring on the mountain attracted 20,000 visitors.

On a spectacularly beautiful Sunday, May 3 2015, more than 700 citizens participated in the 24th Mount Royal Clean-up (*Corvée*), the inaugural activity of Mount Royal Month. Together, they filled 201 garbage bags and 31 sacks of recyclable materials. They also dismantled 35 campfires and 12 campsites, and monitored the growth of 1,400 saplings planted in previous years. The day ended on a musical note with *Salut Printemps!*, a concert performed by *Les Muses Chorale*, a McGill University women's choir. This was the first concert of the 2015 season of *Musical Sundays at the Mount Royal Chalet*.

In May, many walks and hikes were offered, to the delight of lovers of history, geology, flora and the beauty of Mount Royal's landscapes. Exploration and planting activities on the north slope of Mount Royal also allowed ecology enthusiasts to become familiar with the innovative concept of the urban food forest, while doing a little spadework.

Creativity was also in the air with free activities for all. Included were a discovery tour of Mount Royal's remarkable trees, followed by a drawing and watercolour workshop, and an art-nature day with Urban Sketchers Montreal. Also on view at Smith House was a special exhibition entitled *Draw Me a Mountain!* 

The Chromatic festival accepted an invitation from Les amis and the City to create an event that featured visual art, music and performance, and which drew crowds to the Kondiaronk Belvedere.

Finally, Les amis encouraged the public to take advantage of *Mount Royal Month* to discover other organisations established on or close to Mount Royal, notably museums, universities, religious institutions, hospitals, cemeteries, each of which makes an important contribution to the richness and diversity of Mount Royal.



## Prix du Mont-Royal 2015

On May 24, Les amis de la montagne and the City of Montréal paid homage to Jean Doré by awarding him the Prix du Mont-Royal 2015. As Mayor of Montreal (1986-1994), Jean Doré was deeply committed to the mountain. Elected Mayor the same year that Les amis de la montagne was founded, Jean Doré fostered a solid relationship between the City and the organisation, leading Montrealers to reflect on the issues surrounding the preservation of the mountain and bringing about significant improvement in the protection and enhancement of Mount Royal. The Mayor's leadership resulted in the creation of the Mount Royal Heritage Site, the adoption of the first Plan for the Enhancement of Mount Royal in 1992, followed by the establishment of a plan for re-greening the mountain, and redevelopment of the Kondiaronk Belvedere. At the presentation ceremony of the Prix du Mont-Royal 2015, Jean Doré delivered a message about Mount Royal that was imbued with the same vision and conviction that characterised his years in power.

At the same ceremony, an honourable mention was also awarded to Saint Joseph's Oratory on Mount Royal for developing the Père-Louis-Trempe Nature Reserve, inaugurated on the south-east border of the Oratory's site.

# ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION\_

The mountain is an invaluable natural treasure surrounded by an everexpanding urban environment. Maintaining its biodiversity is a constant challenge that demands the design and implementation of strategies to address problems associated with the proliferation of invasive exotic species, climate change, pollution and the intensive use of public space.

Les amis de la montagne plays an active role in biodiversity conservation on Mount Royal. Our Conservation Patrol has been in continuous operation since 2003, and our Environmental Stewardship Programme was established in 2007. We work in partnership with the City of Montréal, as well as key actors in the field of environmental protection, including universities, to develop and test solutions on a regional scale.



## Conservation Patrol



The Conservation Patrol endeavours to make park visitors aware of the environmental challenges facing Mount Royal and the cumulative effect of their actions. The goal is to encourage the public to cease throwing garbage in the undergrowth, making fires and campsites, going off trail on foot or bicycle, and to stop feeding the animals.

The Patrol's activities have expanded this year thanks to the integration of several volunteer interns who contributed 787 hours to our conservation activities. Between June and

October 2015, our patrollers talked to 6,544 park visitors. For the sixth consecutive year, the team led an awareness campaign to persuade park visitors to stop feeding racoons. Behaviour changes, obesity and other health problems, along with overpopulation and imbalance of the ecosystem, are among the consequences of feeding racoons, not to mention the potential risks for human health.

We presented our observation report on problems relating to the use of public spaces in Mount Royal Park (see page 8) to the City of Montréal. This had the effect of strengthening ties between our Conservation Patrol, the police department and other city departments responsible for monitoring, maintaining and protecting the park. It also helped coordinate efforts to reduce activity that has an impact on the natural environment.

Major events that are held on the mountain, as well as their increasing number, have a negative impact on wooded areas. Concerned by the situation, Les amis documented several events and made recommendations to the City of Montréal. The city is now revising the regulatory framework for holding public events in the park and it has invited us to participate in this process.

# **Environmental Stewardship Programme**

In 2015, close to 1,500 people answered the call from Les amis de la montagne to take part in its Environmental Stewardship Programme. They participated alone or with friends and family, on Saturday mornings during the summer. Others came as part of school, corporative or community group initiatives. These volunteers engaged in various tasks related to the biodiversity of Mount Royal, from uprooting invasive exotic species to planting work. This year, participants in this programme planted 1,853 trees, bushes and native ferns encompassing 35 different species in Mount Royal Park.

# The Emerald Ash Borer on Mount Royal



The emerald ash borer epidemic continues to take its toll on the Island of Montreal and is now present on Mount Royal, where one in three trees is an ash. To counter the effects of this beetle on the mountain, Les amis advocates an ecological management approach that includes controlled planting to prevent gaps in the canopy left by the loss of ash trees.


Led by Les amis during the summer of 2015, Joanna

Mara, a student at UQAM, conducted a research project on sustainable management of the wetland ecosystem in Mount Royal Park, an area dominated by the black ash, which has exceptional biodiversity. The wetlands are expected to be greatly affected by the emerald ash borer in the next few years, and will require appropriate rehabilitation measures.

Les amis de la montagne is campaigning for the adoption of an integrated intervention plan that will bring together municipalities, corporate and institutional property owners (hospitals, universities, religious institutions, cemeteries, etc.) in a concerted effort to minimise the impact of the emerald ash borer on Mount Royal. To this end, the organisation will play a major role in raising the awareness of all stakeholders.

# Canopy Action Plan and the Creation of Green Corridors

With the *Mount Royal Seeds for the Future* project, carried out with SOVERDI, Les amis de la montagne contributed to developing the City of Montréal *Canopy Action Plan 2012-2021*. We also took part in discussions on issues concerning the connectivity of natural environments and the creation of green corridors linking the mountain and other green spaces.



# LES AMIS DE LA MONTAGNE AND THE CITY\_\_\_

As an independent non-profit organisation dedicated to the protection and enhancement of Mount Royal, Les amis de la montagne keeps a critical eye on all projects affecting the mountain and works towards achieving sustainability. We also enjoy a special partnership with the City of Montréal as it pertains to Mount Royal Park. This partnership, developed over more than thirty years, is motivated by a vision that is shared by elected politicians, officials and Les amis de la montagne. Together, we fully recognise the advantages of pooling our respective expertise and putting it to use for the benefit of the mountain and of Montréal.

The first partnership agreement was established with *Centre de la montagne*, which was established in 1981, with the primary goal of providing environmental educational services in Mount Royal Park. Since then, Les amis and the Centre de la montagne became associated organisations, working together under the banner of "Les amis de la montagne".


In 2015, Les amis de la montagne and the City of Montréal renewed their agreement for another five-year term (2015-2020). This agreement established rules for the management of activities in Mount Royal Park, primarily concerning:

- \_ educational services and environmental awareness;
- \_ plantation projects, clearing of invasive species and other environmental monitoring;
- \_ interpretive services related to the heritage of Mount Royal;

- \_ welcome centre services at Smith House;
- \_ the Conservation Patrol of Les amis de la montagne;
- outdoor recreational activities and related services:
- \_ other visitor services such as food services and gift shops.

In addition, we make our knowledge and expertise available to the City, at no cost, in an advisory capacity concerning the planning, management, development and maintenance of Mount Royal Park.

This year also marked the development of our partnership with the City of Montréal as regards food services in Mount Royal Park. In December 2015, we expanded our food services to include the Beaver Lake Pavilion. Since then, the café at Smith House and the restaurant in the Pavilion have been operating under the "Café des Amis" banner.






## REINVESTMENT FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PARK AND ITS VISITORS

# ANNUAL FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT\_
